Course Description:

One of the most important questions that every person must wrestle with is only three words and six letters long: "Who am I?" A person's identity is unique among all the people on Earth, so asking oneself that question is really important to the way they understand their life, their purpose and their sense of self. English Language Arts 7 explores books, poems, short stories, and writing activities that can all help students explore this key question. Hopefully, they will help students to both discover who they are as unique persons in all the world, but also to empathize with and appreciate other people as well.

Another through-line for this course is the idea of voice, as students are given an opportunity to discover and develop their own unique voice, both in their writing and in their communicating. As they understand their identity, it is hoped that students will find unique ways to express that identity through a variety of media, and that in doing so, they will grow further in their understanding of ways they can contribute to the world in unique ways.
