### **Course Description:**

English Language Arts 5 is a course in which students will develop their reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills in an engaging, joyful way. The central question of the course is, "What is love?" Students are invited to wrestle with what love is and to recognize the powerful ways that love shapes their lives and the world. Besides studying novels, short stories, and poems about love, students will also have the chance to tell stories about how love has shaped their own lives, guided through step-by-step processes to bring these stories to life. Hopefully, by reading and writing about love, students will become more compassionate, empathetic people, all while growing in their foundational language skills.
